First circular

Dear Colleagues,

We would like to invite you all to the 9th meeting of the European Association of Vertebrate Palaeontologists (EAVP) that will be held in Heraklion, Crete, Greece from June 14 to June 19, 2011. The venue of the meeting will be the new building of the Natural History Museum of Crete located west of the port of Heraklion (<http://www.nhmc.uoc.gr/portal/eavp/>).

The Natural History Museum of Crete (<http://www.nhmc.uoc.gr/en>) is a relatively new museum that has been operating under the auspices of the University of Crete since 1980. The aim of the Museum is to study, protect and promote the special natural history heritage of the Eastern Mediterranean. The Museum hosts zoological, botanical, palaeontological, geological and mineralogical collections mainly from Crete but also from Greece and the Eastern Mediterranean. Although the vertebrate palaeontology collections are not large and diverse they contain a significant number of Cretan Neogene and Quaternary findings. Among the most outstanding are the specimens of the endemic Middle and Late Pleistocene island fauna of Crete that consisted of dwarf hippos, mammoths (*Mammuthus creticus*) and deer (such as *Candiacervus ropalophorus*), small sized elephants, giant mice (*Kritimys catreus* and *Mus minotaurus*) and several raptors, most of which are part of the Kuss collection recently given to the museum by the Natural History Museum of Karlsruhe. However, the most outstanding finding and central exhibit of the museum is the almost complete skeleton of one of the largest *Deinotherium giganteum* that has been found to date from the early Turolian of Eastern Crete which bears the longest ever found deinotherium tusks (1.5 m long).

Heraklion is the capital of Crete Island and the 4th largest city of Greece. It has a long history ranging back to Neolithic times, but it is mostly known for the ancient Minoan Palace of Knossos that is situated in close proximity to the city. Important features of the city are also the Venetian walls that surround the old city and the city centre. The Island of Crete is a well known summer destination, famous for the beautiful beaches, the impressive high mountain peaks, the numerous

canyons, the good Cretan food, the Folk music, the local alcoholic beverage raki, and of course for the Cretan hospitality.

Field Trips

1. Sat June 18th: Katharo Plateau (8:00 – 20:00)

The fieldtrip will start with a visit at the Prassas section. The site is known for the abundance of Late Pliocene fishes. Then we will drive all the way up to Katharo Plateau.

The Katharo Plateau is situated at a height of 1,100 m above sea level. There are no permanent residents on the plateau and only a few scattered buildings are found. The plateau is marginally cultivated and extensively used by shepherds. During the winter, however, the plateau is uninhabited and mostly unused as it is covered by snow. Katharo is the most famous locality of the Cretan dwarf hippos. The site, due to its location, is not exactly the place where one would expect to find hippos. The fossils are found all over the plateau, but at a particular site (Digenis Anaspa) a very rich assemblage with articulated elements has been found. Apart from the hippos, sporadic remains of deer and elephants have been found as well. The fossiliferous deposits have been dated from 850,000 to 375,000 years B.P.. After our visit to the actual fossil sites we will have lunch in one of the three small tavernas on Katharo, which serve mainly to the local farmers and shepherds. The menu will include: stew of feral goat with potatoes, grilled lamb chops, paximadia (twice-baked bread, softened with water and seasoned with olive oil and herbs), local hard cheese and Cretan olives.

2. Sun June 19th : Archaeological site of Knossos palace (9:00 – early afternoon)

If you are interested you may join us to a visit at the archaeological site of Knossos palace. The site is situated just outside the city of Heraklion, 15 minutes drive from the city centre. Knossos was the biggest and richest city of the Minoan civilisation and the palace of Knossos is considered as the cultural centre of the Minoans. The Bronze Age Minoan civilization flourished from approximately the 27th to the 15th centuries BC. The downfall of the Minoan civilization is connected with the eruption of the Santorini volcano around 1450 BC. For more information check <http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Knossos>. Technical information

Posters size should not exceed 84 cm wide x 118 cm high (A0 portrait format). Presenters are requested to hang their poster at the beginning of the meeting, or during coffee breaks, so that the posters will be available during talks, coffee and lunch breaks. There will be two formal poster sessions of one hour, for which the presenting authors are asked to be present. Specific instruction for preparation of posters will be given in the second circular.

Oral presentations must be given using MS-Office Power Point or Open Office Impress. If you are using an Apple Mac, then please bring your own adapter. The duration of each presentation is scheduled for 20 minutes, including 5 minutes for discussion.

Abstracts

Talks and poster offers should be accompanied by a short abstract (no more than 250 words). Abstracts will be published in a conference book, which will be printed for distribution to all participants during the meeting. The abstract volume will also be available later on the EAVP homepage. Abstracts should be sent electronically to George Iliopoulos (iliopoulosg@upatras.gr) as a .rtf or .doc file.

All abstracts must be submitted in English. Each abstract should describe the content of the presentation and should be concise, technically accurate, and well written. The maximum length of the abstract text is one A4 page and must include the abstract title, authors' names and affiliations. Grayscale figures with captions, diagrams, tables, and graphs are possible, but must fit on the same A4 page as the rest of the abstract.

Abstracts will be proofread by the meeting organizers, and in case of necessary changes, will be sent back to the authors for approval.

Further instructions will be sent with the 2nd Circular.

Proceedings Volume

The managing editor of "Palaeobiodiversity and Palaeoenvironments" offered to the EAVP the possibility to publish contributions of the meeting in a special issue of the journal. All participants are invited to submit papers related to their talks or posters. Further instructions will be sent with the 3rd Circular. Please indicate in your registration form whether you wish to provide short papers for such a conference proceedings volume or not.

Transport

You can reach Heraklion either via Athens International Airport or by a direct flight from most European countries' main airports. Tickets for these flights can be easily obtained from online booking sites or local travel agents.

Heraklion Airport access

The airport of Heraklion is situated about 4 km from the city centre. There is a regular bus service between the airport and the city centre; a ticket should be bought before entering the bus and costs about 1 €. A taxi to Heraklion takes 10-15 minutes and costs approximately 15 euros.

Ferries to Heraklion

Nowadays most visitors come to Crete directly by plane. There is, however, the alternative option to take a ferry. From Athens Airport you get the respective bus service or the underground that will take you to the port of Piraeus. Regular ferryboat services are provided between the port of Piraeus (Athens) and Heraklion. In addition, ferries are operated between Heraklion and Santorini, Ios, Paros, Mykonos, Peloponnesus and Rhodes.

Hotels and Accomodation

There are more than 15 hotels near the Natural History Museum of Crete. Their rates range from 40 to 200 euros per day. A list with specific hotels and their rates will be provided with the 2nd circular and will be announced soon on the webpage of the meeting.
