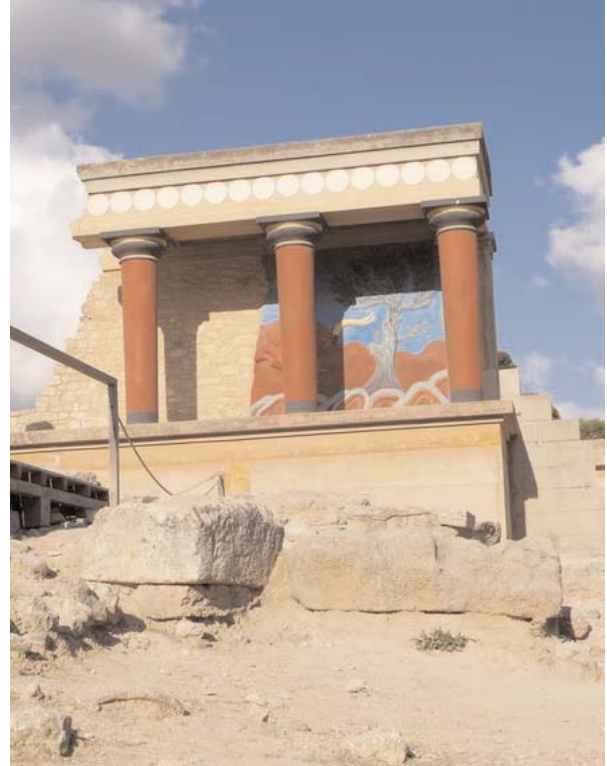
Conference dinner

Visit to Knossos

You may join us to a visit to the archaeological site of Knossos palace. The site is situated just outside the city of Heraklion, 15 minutes drive from the city centre. Knossos was the largest and richest city of the Minoan civilisation (27th to the 15th centuries BCE).



Raymonde Rivoallan Fund

The fund started in 2003 to provide funding for participants who wish to attend EAVP meetings but have insufficient financial support. The successful applicants will be selected by a committee consisting of one of the meeting organisers (George Iliopoulos), the current president of the EAVP (Christian Meyer) and the administrator of the fund (Marie-Celine Buchy). Field trip to Prassas and Katharo

Prassas Cross Section

The fieldtrip will start with a visit at the Prassas section. The site is known for the abundance of Late Pliocene fishes.

Visit to Katharo Plateau

Katharo basin

The Katharo Plateau is situated at a height of 1,100 m above sea level. There are no permanent residents on the plateau and only a few scattered buildings are found. The plateau is marginally cultivated and extensively used by shepherds. During the winter, however, the plateau is uninhabited and mostly unused as it is covered by snow.

The fossil dwarf hippos on Katharo

The Katharo is the most famous locality of dwarf hippos of Crete. The site, due to its location, is not exactly a place where one would expect to find hippos. The fossils are found all over the plateau, but at a particular site (Digenis Anaspa) remains of a complete herd have been found. Apart of the hippo fossils, fossils of deer and elephants have been found as well, but in low numbers. The age of the deposition has been dated between 850,000 and 375,000 years before present.

Traditional Cretan meal on the Katharo

There are 3 small tavernas on Katharo, which serve mainly to the local farmers and shepherds. After the visit to the fossil sites, we will have lunch in those tavernas. The menu will include: stew of feral goat with potatoes, grilled lamb chops, paximadia (twice-baked bread, softened with water and seasoned with olive oil and herbs), local hard cheese and Cretan olives.

Travel

Flights to Heraklion

You can reach Heraklion either via Athens International Airport or by a direct flight from most European countries. Tickets for these flights can be easily obtained from online booking sites or local travel agents.

Heraklion Airport access

The airport of Heraklion is situated about 4 km from the city centre. There is a regular bus service between the airport and the city centre; a ticket should be bought before entering the bus and costs about 1 euro. A taxi to Heraklion takes 10-15 minutes and costs approximately 15 euros.

Ferries to Heraklion

Nowadays most visitors come to Crete directly by plane. There is, however, the option to take a ferry. Regular ferryboat services are provided between the port of Piraeus (Athens) and Heraklion. In addition, ferries are operated between Heraklion and Santorini, Ios, Paros, Mykonos, Pelopponesus and Rhodes.

Technical information

Posters

Posters size should not exceed 84 cm wide x 118 cm high (A0 portrait format). Presenters are requested to hang their poster at the beginning of the meeting, or during coffee breaks, so that the posters will be available during talks, coffee breaks and lunch. There will be two poster sessions of 1 hour, for which the presenting authors are asked to be present. Specific instruction for preparation of posters will be given in the second circular.

Oral presentations

Oral presentations must be given using MS-Office Power Point or Open Office Impress. If you are using an Apple Mac, then please bring your own adapter. The duration of each presentation is scheduled for 20 minutes, including 5 minutes for discussion.

Abstracts

Talks and poster should be accompanied by a short abstract. The abstracts will be published in a conference book which will be printed for distribution to all participants during the meeting. The abstract volume will also be available on the EAVP homepage.

All abstracts must be submitted in English. Each abstract should describe the content of the presentation to be given and should be concise, technically accurate, and well written. The maximum length of the abstract text is one A4 page. In order to meet this, **use the form that is uploaded on website of the meeting** (<http://www.nhmc.uoc.gr/portal/eavp/>).

Grayscale figures with captions, diagrams, tables, and graphs are possible, but must fit on the same A4 page with the rest of the abstract.

Abstracts should be send electronically to George Iliopoulos (iliopoulosg@upatras.gr). Abstracts will be proofread by the meeting organisers, and in case of necessary changes, sent back to the authors for approval.
